2023 BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION SCHEDULE

June 1-13 Voting ballots are available at the HOA office during regular business hours for owners to pick up in person. You must wear your card key or show other identification indicating your lot number – only one ballot per lot. You may not obtain the ballot for any other homeowner. Please read and follow the instructions included with your ballot, so that your ballot will not be disqualified. After completing your ballot, you may return it to the HOA office in person or send it via regular mail. We urge you to pick up your ballot and return it in person, in order to save on mailing expense, and also to assure that it is received by the deadline.

June 13 The notice of the 2022 Annual Meeting and any remaining ballots not picked up in person will be mailed out to owners at their address of record. Make sure that our HOA records include your correct mailing address for you to receive your ballot timely

PLEASE SIGN YOUR BALLOT AND MAKE SURE YOUR LOT NUMBER IS ON THE RETURN ADDRESS ON THE BACK OF THE ENVELOPE

July 12 The Annual Meeting will begin at 2:00 p.m. Ballots received at the HOA office on or before 11:00 a.m. will be counted beginning at 11:30 a.m. until completed by the ballot-counting team of volunteers. Meeting attendees will have an opportunity to submit their ballot, if they have not already done so. The results of the election will be announced at this meeting.

CANDIDATE ELIGIBILITY Per The Villages at Lynx Creek Owners Association Bylaws, Article VI, Section 2: "To be eligible as a candidate, a person must be an Owner in good standing for not less than twelve (12) months immediately preceding the close of the application period and be in physical residence not less than six (6) of the twelve (12) months preceding the close of the application period. Previous interrupted Ownership and/or residency or rental shall not apply toward this requirement."

The phrase "in good standing" means that the owner is not more than thirty days in arrears in their monthly assessment and has not had their HOA membership suspended.







Common Gift Card Scam Scenarios

- Government Imposters: Scammers posing as a government agency (IRS, Law enforcements, Courts, etc.) calling and threatening arrest or penalties if a gift card payment is not provided.
- Utility Companies/Service Providers: Scammers posing as a service provider threatening to shut off a utility unless a gift card payment is made.

REMINDER - NO government agency or legitimate business will reach out and ask you to pay off your debt with gift cards.

• Friends and Family: Scammers posing as loved ones stuck in an emergency situation and requesting gift card payment for help.

REMINDER - Always call the loved one directly or a close relative to confirm their whereabouts prior to sending any money.

ABOUT YOUR H.O.A.

Working with a Homeowners' Association (HOA) board to effect changes in an HOA setting is a complex process. If there are things that you don't like - here are some suggested ways and effective strategies to consider if you want to see changes:

- #1 Understand the governing documents: Familiarize yourself with the HOA's bylaws, covenants, conditions, and restrictions (CC&R). Getting acquainted with these documents will help you identify specific rules or restrictions you want to address and provide a foundation for proposing changes. It's important to thoroughly review these documents as they are essential reading for every resident in an HOA-governed community. Keep in mind that anyone living in an HOA governed community has a responsibility to read these documents before purchasing a home.
- #2 Build relationships: Develop positive connections with staff, HOA board members and fellow residents. Attend regular HOA meetings, volunteer for committees, and engage in open and respectful communication. Building rapport and trust will increase your influence when advocating for change.
- #3 Educate yourself and others: Conduct research on the applicable state, county, city, and town laws and regulations that govern HOAs in this area. Becoming well-informed about your rights and the board's responsibilities is crucial. Share this knowledge with other residents to create a united front for change. The HOA board has limited ability to change state and local laws so understanding the laws is an important element of dealing with change. It is our responsibility as citizens to know the laws.
- #4 Form a coalition: Identify like-minded residents who are also interested in making changes to restrictive HOA policies. By forming a coalition, you can have a stronger collective voice and increase your chances of success. Work together to strategize and present a unified front to the board.
- #5 Propose positive alternatives and compromises: Instead of simply opposing existing rules, suggest alternative solutions or compromises that address the concerns of both residents and the HOA board. Present your ideas in a constructive and well-reasoned manner, emphasizing the potential benefits for the community. This approach is more likely to resonate with others and promote change. Selling features and benefits to everyone helps change along while simple criticism or arguments will fail.
- #6 Attend board and committee meetings: Regularly participate in HOA board and committee meetings to stay informed and actively engage in discussions. Request a public comment period or ask to be added to the agenda to present your proposals and concerns. Prepare your comments in advance, ensuring they are well thought out and logical. This will help others understand your perspective and strengthen your case. Use the 3-minute resident comment period at each HOA meeting to state your case.
- #7 Seek board representation: Encourage community members who support your cause to run for positions on the HOA board during elections. Having sympathetic individuals on the board can facilitate change from within.
- #8 Petition for change: If there is widespread support for the proposed changes, consider circulating a petition among residents to demonstrate community backing. A petition can be a persuasive tool to show the board the level of support for specific modifications. Remember, if you desire change, it's important to actively bring it to the attention of the board.

In summary, keep in mind that the board members are homeowners in our community who volunteer their time and skills to manage the organization and give their support so that we maintain the value of our homes. When communicating with them, it's essential to approach discussions in a respectful and constructive manner, avoiding unnecessary criticisms or repetitive arguments that may detract from the overall positive living environment we enjoy. WHY DO WE HAVE AN ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE

One homeowners' opinion

Why do we need processes and guidelines to maintain architectural standards?

Perhaps most importantly, the rules provide the basis for treating all homeowners fairly and reasonably. Written guidelines allow homeowners and the design review committee to work from the same criteria. These are guidelines and can be changed by working with the board and the other owners to reflect the needs of the community.

Often the architectural requirements can be complex. The guidelines show exactly what is required and help owners with design improvements that comply with the Association's standards.

Request for Change Application and Approval process

The Architecture Committee wants the paperwork to be as simple as possible for everyone. We are not automated so everything must be done manually, which takes a great deal of time and effort to review each request. Having guidelines takes the guesswork out of the application and the committee's decision making.

In fact, having these guidelines not only provides criteria for the current committee to make appropriate decisions, but for successive committee members to make consistent decisions in the future. Without the criteria in the guidelines, the application approved today may result in construction deemed unacceptable by new committee members upon completion.

The Association's authority

One last purpose of the guidelines is to clarify the authority the homeowner's association has in this area. State statutes and governing documents give the association a legal right to enact and enforce design review standards. The Architectural guidelines spell this out so everyone understands they must comply even if they don't agree.

You can meet with the Architectural Committee on the third Wednesday of each month at 9:00 in the Card Room. You can also stop by the Architectural Office (near the laundry room) any Wednesday at 9:00 for a quick answer.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN THE LAST TWO YEARS

We wanted to take a moment to list some to the accomplishments of the Board over the past two years to update current and new residents of the improvements made to our Community that have enhanced our property values and our daily lives:

Creating an Investment Committee and guidelines for investing the General and Electric Reserve Funds. To date, this has gained \$22,400 for the Reserve Funds.

Increasing the Asset Preservation Fee . This increased the reserve fund by \$91,555.

Created a Capital Expenditure and Major Expenses Budget to compliment the Operating Budget so that residents can easily review these expenses prior to their implementation and throughout the year.

Revamped the Maintenance Department. The Villages grounds are in great shape; the trees are well maintained; the dog park is in excellent shape. The Maintenance Building has been cleaned up and inventoried. The maintenance outbuilding has been cleaned, inventoried and repaired. The maintenance yard has been cleaned of debris from 20+ years. The backlog of work orders has been completed and new ones handled in a more efficient manner.

The pool deck has been resurfaced.

Our major road project has been completed with some roads replaced and all roads treated to extend their life.

The dog park was extended with new fencing added and an agility and/or separate park for vigorous dogs added.

The Office staff has incorporated a new assessment and utility billing system that enables the office to keep much better track of payments and has decreased the time needed for billing and payment application.

The phone system was changed to a much more efficient system.

An answering service for maintenance emergencies has been implemented.

The water system has been proactively repaired and mapped out for efficient turn off of the water when needed.

The entertainment systems in the common area room have been updated.

The billiard tables have been repaired.

The fitness room has been completely renovated with new equipment, floors, painting and security cameras added.

The key card badge system was created to increase security in the common area.

The rv storage gate on the south storage was updated to a mechanized gate for greater security.

We worked with Desert Pines to construct a brick wall around the North rv storage lot and add a solid iron gate to enhance the look and security of the lot.

The Maintenance gate was mechanized for greater security.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN THE LAST TWO YEARS

(continued)

The rv storage lots, Community gavel lot and maintenance yard lot were resurfaced.

The rv lease agreement and billing system was updated to more effectively encompass the needs of the storage renters.

The pool was drained, cleaned and the filtration system were updated to comply with health department.

A second heater was installed in the pool system.

The pool and spa pump room were cleaned, updated for compliance with the health department.

The exhaust system from the laundry room was rerouted outside of the pump room to keep the pump room clean.

New equipment and fixtures requested by the kitchen manager has been purchased and installed.

The drainage for the social hall was revamped to insure that flooding will not happen again.

The planter in the common area were updated with seasonal plants and painted.

Hummingbird park was beautified.

New signage / artwork in the common / pool area was purchased with new planters and benches purchased to enhance our main entrance.

New chairs were purchased for the pickleball and tennis courts.

The laundry room door was changed to a self-opening and closing door to assist those with mobility issues to use the laundry room. New seating, television and sinks were purchased to upgrade the room.

The Board implemented a monthly Meet the Manager meeting to address resident concerns and to solicit input from residents about changes or expenditures.

Our pickleball courts are scheduled to be re-surfaced with new netting installed between the courts.

New signs are scheduled to be installed to more easily identify Lot Numbers for deliveries. Stop signs and other dated / rusted signs will be replaced or added. New speed limit signs will be installed including in areas of the Community where none exist now.



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
